


2023 REPORT

The MWL Education Fund opens the doors of the State House to people who care about gender equity. We work to help Mainers develop the knowledge, skills, and confidence to engage in feminist, anti-oppression-based public policy advocacy and civic life. We do this through programming focused on community building and community organizing in order to increase knowledge, skills, and opportunities for citizens to engage in public policy change. At the center of this work are our two youth-serving programs: Girls Day at the State House, now in its 27th year, and the Youth Policy Leadership Forum, which completed its inaugural year this year.

Program Outcomes

This year's program not only expanded to more participants from different age levels, as well as learning over a longer period of time and in greater detail, but the program also expanded in its commitment to gender equity and the current realities of how young people identify, choose to exercise their autonomy, and believe in their ability to be part of civic life regardless of expression, age, sexuality, and gender identity. As the young participants convened over the course of the program to gain tools and understanding of procedures in policy, they also articulated their passion for specific issues, life experiences and observations, and goals for action to make the changes they hoped to see in the world.

Not only was this program profoundly life-changing and powerful for the participants, but it struck people both ways - the participants realized their power as much as our volunteer legislators, lobbyists, and other change-makers, like the Maine Secretary of State, realized how strong the voices of youth are in Maine. We found that not only did students feel empowered by being able to connect with each other, but many were surprised and heartened to interact with legislators from both sides of the aisle. We were so honored to have a role in bringing this programming to youth in Maine.
